The United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) is the global humanitarian aid and development organization of the United Methodist Church. Founded in 1940 by the General Conference of the Methodist Church (USA) in response to World War II's devastating effects around the world.

It is a non-profit organization operated under the

auspices of the General Board of Global Ministries. UMCOR works through programs that address hunger, poverty, sustainable agriculture, international and domestic emergencies, refugee and immigrant concerns and global health issues.

UMCOR's current responsibility is to provide immediate relief of acute human need and to respond to the

suffering of persons in the world caused by natural, ecological, political turmoil, and civil disasters. UMCOR is the first in and the last out with all disasters. They support immediate and long-term disaster relief efforts by stockpiling aid items and keeping a unit of trained "disaster response specialists" ready for immediate dispatch.



long as we stay focused upon our mission which is to make disciples of Jesus Christ.

For some the news coming out of General Conference is quite exciting while for others it is disappointing. I will say, from those who attended, the spirit of the Conference was like none they'd experienced in a long time. There was a feeling of mutual respect as well as camaraderie. There was a willingness to work together even though there were a variety of opinions around various subjects. Indeed there were major decisions made at General Conference for the future of the church. There were major decisions around our structure, social issues, most prominently sexuality, and financial issues for the Church moving forward.

While space does not permit a full insight into all decisions, let me offer a couple of thoughts. First, one of the major changes was what has been called "Regionalization." For many decades now, the United States has sat upon the seat of power in the United Methodist Church. The Church, though global, has been dominated by U.S. voices. Many items of legislation, for instance, have focused on predominant U.S. issues like pension programs. All to say, many from around the globe were dealing with matters that didn't pertain to their context nor were their voices really being heard with issues that needed discussing. Thus, the General Conference moved to regionalize the Church putting all areas (like the U.S., Africa, etc) on equal footing. Such allows for varied issues to be tackled within the contexts pertaining to those specific areas.

While core beliefs will remain, some specific items in the Discipline may be altered for specific contexts.

This brings us to the second major decision that happened at General Conference, which was around the issue of sexuality. As you may be aware, the language that "homosexuality is incompatible with Christian teaching" was removed from our discipline as well as other language regarding homosexuality in the Discipline (e.g. the language of homosexuality and qualification for ministry).

The intention of the removal was to recognize as a denomination, we do not agree about issues related to homosexuality. And the Church is willing to live in this disagreement and allow Conferences, bishops, churches, boards of ministry, and individuals to make decisions of conscience around issues of sexuality. Some United Methodist churches may choose to allow gay weddings, some may not. Some pastors may choose to do a gay wedding, some may not. Some churches may welcome a gay pastor, others may not.

All to say, we don't agree and so levity has been given for those who want to be fully inclusive and have a place and for those who feel different to also have a place. It opens the table for all to be present and participate fully in the life of the church recognizing God is at work among us and even at times beyond us.









#### A Day of Discovery: Pipes, Pedals, and Pizza

On Saturday, April 27, First United Methodist Church and St Peter's Episcopal Church, Conway, along with the Central Arkansas Chapter American Guild of Organists, hosted Pipes, Pedals, and Pizza.

Fifteen young future organists along with almost as many parents and guardians from around central Arkansas got up early and arrived at Conway FUMC to start a full day to meet and interact with a marvelous musical machine: the pipe organ.

Activities started with a chance to ask questions of real-life organists: When did you start playing? What do you like to play? Why are you an organist? Do you play other instruments? Do you have to practice? Organists James Stanley, John Krebs, Sungyun Kim, and Jason Saugey were ready with all the answers, and they all agreed they did have to practice.

A quick (and careful) climb up the steep and curvy stairs brought all participants to the console of the FUMC organ to see for themselves where and how the instrument is played and what all the buttons, knobs, keys, and pedals do. Then, each student took the organ for a test drive, playing a few tunes on one stop or two or three or in creative combinations — some even tried the

pedal keys and played with their feet!
Following lunch, it was time for the short walk down the street to St.
Peter's to meet another pipe organ with an entirely different personality.
St. Peter's Director of Music JoAna Rusche welcomed everyone to the

church and pointed out the particulars of the interior, both the similarities and differences between the two spaces of the day. A discussion of how different traditions use the organ in worship, and how, despite some variations, the organ still plays a vital role in lifting hearts, minds, and voices was held. Since much of the pipework is exposed at St. Peter's, young organists were able to see close up the different shapes and sizes of the pipes.

To conclude the day: the Boomwhacker Experience. Linda Ball came prepared with a giant net full of plastic tubes, different in length, but all red in color, all C's. Instead of teaching a complicated math lesson about fractions, Linda showed how shorter tubes (pipes) made higher pitches, and how a tube twice as long made a pitch an octave lower. In combination, all the tubes (pipes) made a chorus. A boomwhacker organ!

A few days later, I asked one of my piano students what he thought about Pipes, Pedals and Pizza. His face lit up, his eyes got wide, and he put on a big broad smile. "I liked it all! But especially I liked sitting at the organ and playing the trumpets!" It was a good day.

#### Trustees Update

The Conway FUMC Trustees committee is in the process of purchasing a new 15-passenger van! Our current 15-passenger van is about 24 years old and has been good to us. But due to many safety concerns, it's time to buy a new one. Once again, thanks to the Dickson Estate and the C1Youth Group (which gave a generous donation of \$10,000) as well as other various entities, we are able to purchase this van with cash without financing at the current 9 percent interest rate!

Keep your eyes open over the next couple of weeks for the new van to hit our parking lot!
